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
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THIS SUMMER, IT'S TIME TO LIVEN UP YOUR OUTDOOR SPACE.

Then you look at your patio.

Start with the basics.

Outdoor furniture has come a long way in the last 10 years. In many cases, what's available today is almost indistinguishable from indoor furniture. and metal to man-made materials resembling concrete, marble and bamboo-mean that your outdoor furniture can now withstand rain and sun without suffering damage from fading, mildew or rot. Additionally, today's outdoor fabrics and trims are as varied

between every color under the rainbow, from whimsical prints to elegant wovens. And with every style available from traditional to modern, it's far easier today than it used to be to have your outdoor furniture blend seamlessly with the style and palette of your indoor

spaces. Add a rug.

There's no need for all that style and color to be relegated to the furniture. Give your

outdoor space some drama and pizazz by adding a rug designed to withstand harsher conditions. Geometric, floral and abstract patterns can really give a color punch to your outdoor setting. Plus, they will offer comfort underfoot.

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
